2 Henry IV

War, Conflict and Violence

- In *Henry IV Part 2*, the rebellion against King Henry continues to cause civil war.
- There are on stage sword fights, e.g. between Falstaff and Pistol.

Death and Grief

- The play opens with Northumberland receiving the news that Hotspur (his son) has died, and we see Northumberland grieve this loss.
- We see the death of King Henry IV, and King Henry V having to come to terms with his new role as the monarch in the midst of his grief.

Fatphobia

 Like Henry IV Part 1, Part 2 includes many disparaging jokes about Falstaff's weight.

Alcohol

Falstaff's excessive drinking could be triggering for some, especially as it
often framed as an addiction which leads to money troubles.

Child Mortality

- In Act 1, Scene 3, there is an allusion to still-birth and in Act 4, Scene 2, miscarriage is used as a metaphor.
- In Act 5, there are repeated references to miscarriage in the scene where Doll Tearsheet is arrested.

Xenophobia/ Religious Prejudice

 Associations of the Ottoman Empire or 'Turks' (also a derogatory term for Muslims) with tyranny.
